MESSAGE FROM RABBI LISA DELSON

Sights, Sounds, and Connection: Passover

My television-watching hours and days are fewer and farther between than they used to be. However, in a previous season of my life, I used to enjoy watching the Food Network. Every half hour there was a new way to prepare and think about food. At one point, there was a show called Best Thing I Ever Ate. The premise was simple, the celebrity chef would come on screen and describe, in detail, a dish that gave them immense joy and pleasure. The idea of the show grew because, apparently, people ask celebrity chefs about the best thing they ever ate all the time. Each episode would highlight one item from fried chicken to guilty pleasures, to chocolate, to breakfast, to pizza. The last line in the introduction says, "Not only will I tell you the best thing I ever ate but I will tell you where you can get it." Food preferences are so personal, and this show makes the viewer feel more connected to them because they are sharing a part of their lives.

While I may not often get asked what my favorite foods are, people do like to know my favorite Jewish texts, experiences, and sometimes favorite hamantashen variety. I am often asked what is my favorite holiday on the Jewish calendar? My answer is always Passover. It has everything - ritual, tradition, innovation, food, and family. There is much to love about Passover, but three aspects stand out to me.

1. The Story – Throughout our seder, we use symbols to tell the story of the Exodus from Egypt in the form of a Greek feast. With each drop of wine on our plates, we recall the ten plagues that befell the Egyptians after God hardened Pharaoh's heart. We dip strands of parsley in salt-water to remind us of the bitterness of slavery and also the promise of spring. Just like the four children, the Haggadah reminds us we all learn and understand in different ways. As we turn each page we are included in the story by asking questions, recognizing symbols that are not often on our tables, and see how what happened to the Israelites can remind us to welcome the stranger and learn from our mistakes rather than repeat them. It ties us together unlike any other holiday on the Jewish calendar.
2. The Food – Preparations begin long before the first seder with menus, lists reminding us what to clean, who to invite, and what to buy for the seder. The food is as important as the story itself because food helps us tell the story. Matzah is considered the bread of affliction that our ancestors had to endure and so do we during the seven (or eight) day festival. From the first bite at the seder table to the chocolate and toffee covered version, matzah is a staple. The other edible symbols on the seder plate pull us further into the story, the egg, shank bone, charoset, bitter herb, green vegetable, and sometimes an orange. Whether your family makes brisket, salmon, or tofu, each dish tells a story which becomes part of our story, part of THE story.
3. The Connection – Between the Haggadah journey and the food stories, connections are made by sitting around a table with others. Passover begs that we take a step outside of our busy lives and rest as free people, unshackled by the demands of the world. This connection between our family and friends and the entire Jewish world is what makes Passover the best holiday we share. It provides us with a sense of pride and well-being that carries us through, and we welcome it year after year.

Preparing Your Passover Seder

First Seder is Monday evening, April 22, 2024

Beitzah (Egg)-A roasted egg, symbolizing the continuing cycle of life. There are also those who see the egg as a symbol of the Jewish people's will to survive. Just as the egg becomes harder the longer it cooks, so the Jewish people have emerged from the crucible of persecution as a strong and living people.

Shank Bone-a roasted bone, symbolizing the paschal offering brought to the Temple in Jerusalem in ancient times. Many Jews see the shank bone as a symbol of God's outstretched arms, helping Jewish people in times of trouble.

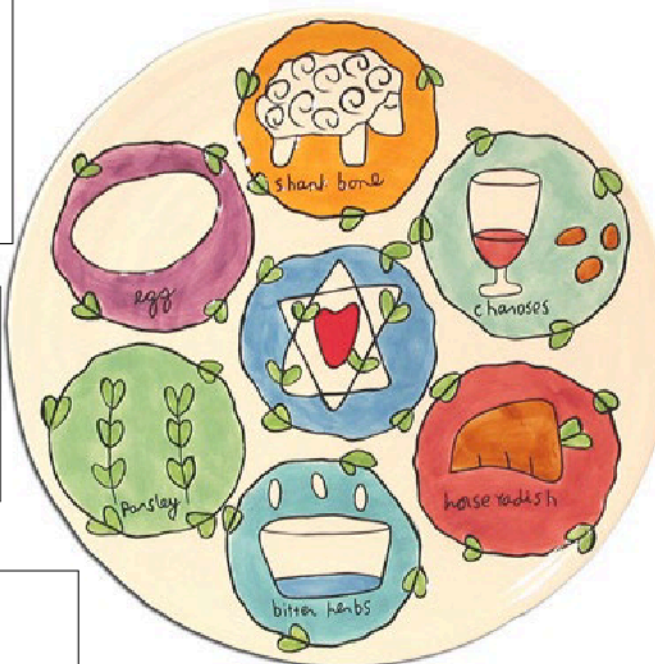
Matzah-Three matzah, placed one on top of the other, are used during the Seder. They are seen as symbolic of the three categories of Jews: priests (Kohanim), Levites, and Israelites.



Charoset-A mixture of chopped apples, nuts, wine and spices symbolizing the mortar that our ancestors used to make bricks in Egypt. (To make Charoset, peel, core, and chop 8-10 large apples. Add 10-12oz. of chopped pecans, almonds, and/or walnuts, 1 1/2 cups sweet wine, 1 Tbsp. cinnamon and 4 Tbsp. sugar).

Maror-The bitter herbs, usually a horseradish root, symbolizing the bitterness that our forefathers experienced as slaves in Egypt, and in a contemporary sense, the lot of all who are enslaved.

Karpas-A vegetable, usually green such as parsley, symbolizing spring and its spirit of hope, as well as the Jews undying faith in the future.



Elijah's Cup

A special cup filled with wine, placed prominently on the table. According to legend, Elijah visits every home on Passover and drinks from his cup.

Salt Water-Symbolizing the tears our ancestors shed in Egypt.

A Cup of Wine is placed at each table setting. The sanctification of the holiday is pronounced over the first cup. Three additional cups are drunk during the course of the Seder, making a total of four to symbolize the four expressions of the Lord's promise to redeem the children of Israel and deliver them from bondage.

Haggadah-(the telling) contains the complete Seder ceremonies in their prescribed order (seder). The first part of the book, concerned mainly with the story of the Jews deliverance from Egypt. It is read before the meal. After dinner follows the second portion consisting of prayers of praise and thanks to the Almighty.

Candles are lighted to usher in the festival of Passover. The benediction which is pronounced over the candles gives a religious meaning to this simple act. An abundance of light symbolizes joy and festivity.

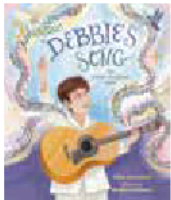


April 7 is the next session of Temple Tots. Where is the afikomen? Activities will be related to the holiday of Passover. Tots begins at 9:30am.

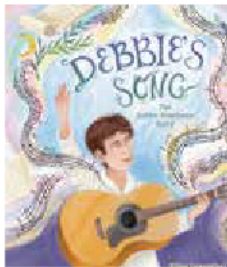

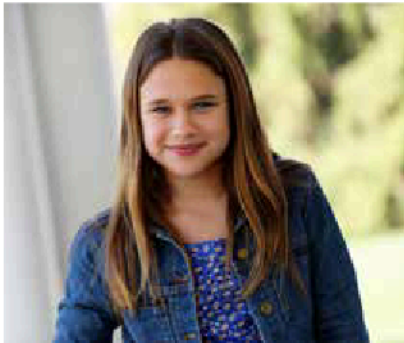


Inaugural Social Action Meeting
